THE Education Ministry has signed a memorandum of agreement (MoA) with seven local universities for the Bachelor of Education (Teaching English as a Second Language) programme.

The memorandum was signed by secretary-general Datuk Ambrin Buang and representatives from Universiti Utara Malaysia, Universiti Malaya, International Islamic University Malaysia, Universiti Pendidikan Sultan Idris, Universiti Putra Malaysia, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia and Universiti Teknologi Mara. The Ministry has also entered into partnerships with several overseas universities to deliver a similar programme.

Through the collaboration, which began in 2002 and will continue until 2011, these universities will produce English teachers for the Ministry. About 500 students are selected for the programme every year; 375 students undergo the local link programme and 125, the overseas link programme.

The five foreign partner universities are: College of St Mark and St John/Exeter University, United Kingdom; Queensland University of Technology, Australia; Victoria University of Wellington, New Zealand; University of Auckland, New Zealand; and Macquarie University, Australia. The Ministry signed a MoA with them in 2002.

EIGHT students of Cima (Chartered Institute of Management Accountants) received awards for being in the top 10 positions worldwide in the examinations held in 2003.

The recipients were Wong Yim Fun, Wong Choy Foong, H'ng Li Seng, Ng Kok Hoe, Norhajar bt Ahmad, Mohammad Zuhri, Gulzat Okunova and Donrudee Suwirachwitayakit.

Students begin the programme with a 60-week foundation course at teacher training colleges under the Teacher Education Division, after which successful candidates will go on to pursue a four-year programme.

They will spend two years in the teaching colleges and two years in the respective partner universities either on a 1+2+1 or 2+2 scheme. "The ministry has embarked on

this programme with the aim of increasing the number of qualified English language teachers in primary and secondary schools and to replace experienced teachers who have retired from government service," explained Ambrin at the signing.
