BDA holds community outreach programme for 8 longhouses in Jelalong

The event was attended by some 200 representatives of local communities from eight nearby

longhouses.

The presentation included talks on the roles and responsibilities of BDA, open burning awareness and waste disposal management techniques by BDA, DoE and NREB.

GPSB conducted a sharing session with the communities on the best agriculture practices of oil palm planting including weeding method, manuring, harvesting, pruning, pest and disease control and chemical safety and health.

UPMKB conducted a hands-on session on a step-by-step process of making home composting to the local communities.

Meanwhile, a session on making pineapple jam was conducted by DoA.

These knowledge sharing sessions are expected to leave a positive impact on Jelalong communities in relation to environmental practices and awareness, and livelihoods.

BDA safety and health section (SHO) manager Lydia Soloma Jalong, in her welcoming remarks, said this programme promotes sustainable environmental practices and initiatives to protect the environment, improve access to clean water, reduce pollution and elevate the livelihood of the community in Jelalong.
