- Malaysia's version of an Ivy League institution.
- Target to become one of 100 best universities globally.
- Autonomy in finance, service scheme, management, student intake and study fees.
- Student admission to reflect the demographic profile of the country and merit.
- Twenty per cent of seats for foreign students.
- Board of directors comprising of top professionals.
- Stringent process to select vice-chancellor.
- Only top experts including foreigners, would be appointed as administrators, lecturers or deans.
- Better terms of service and salary to foreign lecturers.

The Apex programme is aimed at encouraging local universities to keep pace with changes in the academic, economic and social fields. The government has set 2020 as the target year for at least two local universities to achieve this.

Nine universities were in the running: Universiti Islam Antarabangsa Malaysia, Universiti Sains Islam Malaysia, Universiti Tenaga Nasional, Universiti Teknologi Petronas, Universiti Teknologi Malaysia, Universiti Malaya, Universiti Kebangsaan Malaysia, Universiti Sains Malaysia and Universiti Putra Malaysia.
