> HYLI), in Jakarta, Indonesia in July. They are Yom Nurul Akmar Abdul Lahsan, Rena Rajadorai, Yanti Norafizza Mansor and Alan Kwan Wai Ming, all undergraduates of local public universities.

> These four successful candidates were selected from among 57 undergraduates and postgraduates from six leading public universities in Malaysia after a rigorous process which included a university shortlist, submission of written essays and panel interviews. Consistent with the programme's

> concept of bringing together the best young minds from around Southeast Asia and challenging them to form ideas and plans on overcoming specific current issues affecting the region, the four Malaysians will be among the 28 top university students from Indonesia, Japan, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam taking part in the 9th HYLI which will be held on July 7-11. This year's theme is Strengthéning Asian Partnerships — Economic Integration and Energy Management. Yom Nurul Akmar, a third-year

student from the Faculty-of **Environmental Studies at Universiti** Putra Malaysia (UPM) says the initiative is a good opportunity for

her to get her ideas across.
"I can make my opinions count when it comes to environmental issues, which are usually not given due importance," says the 20-year-old environmental science

major. Yom Nurul Akmar is active in university activities, particularly those dealing with the environment and the outdoors.

Having won a number of prizes in several parliamentary-style debating competitions both in school and at district level, Yom Nurul Akmar is resourceful, reliable, self-motivated, determined and team-spirited.

An outdoor person, Yom Nurul

Akmar's greatest passion is horse riding and playing polo. She is also an avid and accomplished

participant in equestrian sport.

"I have lots to do and I need to prepare for the big day," says Yanti Norafizza, who comes across as enthusiastic, highly motivated and committed.

She says that her parents have been supportive of her interests.

Yanti is also an active participant
