elty to a maximum RM100,000 fine and up to three years' prison, repeat offenders could now face a RM200.000 fine and a minimum three months' prison.

Under the Animal Act, the maximum fine is only RM200.

Another suggestion was that shelters be provided to home animals in the event their owners do not have licences or have their licences revoked, he told reporters vesterday, after closing the World Organisation for Animal Health's (OIE) third Global Conference on Animal Welfare.

Chua said the draft, which was put online on Aug 31 to get feedback from the public, had received 537 responses with another 703

collected by the Veterinary Services Department. Based on the responses, seven

new suggestions by the public were added to the Bill. He said the country would also set a Centre of Excellence for animal welfare in Universiti Putra

Malaysia. The centre would act as a research hub for animal welfare with other OIE member coun-

During the conference, the ministry also launched the National Strategic Plan for Animal Wel-

The plan will be a guideline to raise animal welfare standards to be on par with other developed nations by 2020 and is estimated to cost the Government RM80mil over the next eight years.
