## Martial arts exponents hope for a golden outing at Asiad

SEMENYIH: Kuala Lumpur SEA Games martial arts gold medallists – Loh Jack Chang (wushu); M. Mathivani and Syakilla Salni Jefry Krisnan (karate) – are hoping to get a chance to shine at the Jakarta Asian Games next August.

The 30-year-old Jack Chang, who won two golds at the SEA Games for the first time – in taijijian (taiji sword) and compulsory taijiquan – hopes to get his act right in his third Asiad outing.

"Tve returned home empty-handed from two Asian Games. I want to end my medal drought," said the Master in Business Administration graduate from Universiti Putra Malaysia (UPM).

"It's been a year of mixed fortunes for me. I did well to win two gold medals at the KL Games but none at the World Championships.

"My knee injury has flared up again, but I am recovering. I hope to win my first Asiad medal."

For Syakilla, however, it's about winning a second Asiad gold. This time it's in a lower weight category. "I won the 2014 Asian Games gold (in the Under-65kg) in Incheon. It'll be quite competitive at the Jakarta Asiad because I'll be fighting in the below 55kg category. That's going to be challenging," said the 25-yearold.

"It's been an interesting year for me. I started poorly after undergoing an elbow surgery. I missed many competitions. I returned and won a bronze at the Asian Championships and then came the KL Games success.

"I also have another goal next year – the World Championships. No one from Malaysia has won a world title in karate. I also want to qualify for the 2020 Olympic Games."

As for teacher Mathivani, she is dreaming of a golden Asian debut after helping Malaysia beat Vietnam 2-1 to clinch the women's team kumite gold at the KL Games.

"It's been a year of blessing for me. It's hard to juggle between teaching and sports, but my success at the KL Games showed me that I can do it," said the 26-year-old, who has been with the national team

since 2007.
